



Spot a dead hand

- 1 No such hand.** The exposures together fit no line on this year's card.
- 2 Concealed hand exposed.** The only lines they fit are marked C.
- 3 Incorrect exposure.** An exposed pair, NEWS or year group, or a Joker in a pair.
- 4 Unwinnable.** They still need a pair and three of that tile are visible, or a single and all four are visible.
- 5 Wrong count.** Concealed plus exposed tiles isn't 13 (14 on their turn).

Playing out of turn and picking ahead also break the rules.

How a challenge works

- Say it out loud. Asking "is your hand dead?" counts as a challenge.
- Base it only on tiles everyone can see, never a guess about a concealed rack.
- The player either accepts and stops playing, or denies it without revealing their hand. Play continues.
- If denied, check at the end of the hand. **Whoever was wrong pays the other 50.**
- You can't declare your own hand dead. Keep playing, safely.
- A dead hand still pays the winner. Jokers in its earlier, legal exposures can still be exchanged; an incorrect exposure goes back into the rack.

Playing defense

Switch when...

- The wall is short and you still need three or more tiles.
- An opponent has made a third exposure.
- The tiles you need (especially for a pair) are already gone.

Then

- Hold tiles others clearly need, even if it breaks your hand. A wall game costs nothing; throwing the winner costs double.
- Don't call tiles just to expose them.
- Exchange for Jokers when you can: a Joker is a perfectly safe discard later.

Discard	Risk
A Joker (can never be called)	None
A tile whose other three copies are visible (still callable with Jokers, or as a final single)	Low
A tile just discarded and not called	Low
A tile outside every exposed hand you can read	Moderate
A tile you hold two of and haven't seen thrown	High
A Flower, late in the hand	High

Read exposures against the card. Every exposure has to fit a real line, so each one narrows what a player is building. A set has 8 Jokers: every Joker you can see is one nobody is holding. A player with no exposures late in the hand may be playing a concealed or Singles and Pairs hand.
